Harry Horatio Mellor was the son of Richard and Lydia Mellor and the older brother of Alphonso Mellor [see 107: Alphonso Mellor for additional details of this family].

The only census return in which Harry appears with his parents and siblings (Alphonso was not born until late 1893) is that of 1881:


Harry Horatio Mellor's birth was registered in the Birkenhead district in July / September 1880.

In the 1891 census the only Harry Mellor meeting the criteria was the Harry, aged 10, born Seacombe, recorded as an errand boy in the census for Seacombe Cottage Hospital where he may have been a patient. Unfortunately, Harry Mellor has not been traced anywhere within England & Wales in the 1901 census.

Whilst it is uncertain as to when Richard and Lydia Mellor moved to Burton - they were in the village at the time of the 1911 census, but not there in 1901 - it is known that Harry Horatio Mellor married Margaret Edith Foulds at the Congregational School Chapel on Liscard Road, Seacombe, in July/September 1905.

It is possible that Harry moved with his parents from Wallasey to Burton before he married (although the date of this move is unknown); it is equally possible that he and Margaret moved there sometime after their marriage and before the birth of their first child, Horace Coslett Mellor, on 9 December 1908. 'Coslett' was the maiden name of Harry's mother, Lydia Ann, and Horace was born at Burton Point and baptised at Burton church on 31 January 1909 when his father, Harry, was recorded as a mariner.

However, by the time of the 1911 census Harry, Margaret and Horace were living in Birkenhead whilst Harry's parents, married sister Lucy and unmarried brother Alphonso (Alf) were living in 'Ivy Cottage', Burton, near the entrance to the church:

Richard Mellor, 66, and Lydia (with married daughter Sarah Jane Nicholls in Birkenhead at the time of the census), the parents of Harry were living here with Harry's brother Alf (Alphonso) and married sister Lucy and William Macgregor and their son, William Gregor Macgregor.

It appears that Harry and his family continued to live in Birkenhead for some years and that at least two further children were born there:

Lydia Ann Mellor, Harry's mother, died in 1916 aged 67 and she was buried at Burton on 28 March. It is not known whether Harry's father, Richard, continued to live in Burton after Lydia's death but Alf (Alphonso) had joined the Cheshire Regiment in September 1914 and then lived in Chester where he married Margaret Hannah Williams later in the year. It is also possible that Lucy Macgregor and family moved away from Burton shortly after the 1911 census; the birth of an Irene Sylvia Ledward Macgregor, mother's maiden name recorded as Mellor, was registered in Stockport in

late 1913.

Nothing is known of the service history of Harry Mellor or of the circumstances of his death, nearly four months after the November 1918 Armistice, although his Medal Rolls Index Card notes that he enlisted on 11 October 1915 but was discharged, through 'sickness' just 14 months later on 30 December 1916. The Army Registers of Soldiers' Effects record gives some further details, noting

that his rank was 2nd Corporal and that he served with the 1st Cheshire Field Company (a Territorial

Force) of the Royal Engineers. It is known that Harry was, on 7 May 1916, promoted to Acting Lance Corporal and on 30 May 1916 he became an Acting Corporal.

Harry was discharged from the army under Paragraph 392 of King's Regulations 1912 (as amended by Army Order 305 of 1915 - manuscript amendment shown here in red)

which dealt with those who were considered to be no longer physically fit for war service:

(xvi) No longer physically fit for war service—
At home . . . O.C. . O.C. . .

Abroad Do. O.C. . . O.C. . . O.C. . . O.C. at home.

A soldier found medically unfit to re-engage and any man discharged for insanity, irrespective of his length



Except as stated above,
a soldier under three months'
service will be dealt with under class
(iii), unless he is suffering from a
disability of a serious nature which
unfits him for further service
and clearly originated after final

The entry for Harry
Mellor's burial in Burton gives
the date as 2 March presumably recorded here
incorrectly as his official date
of death was 4 March.
However, the burial register
states also that Harry was
then living in Puddington:

In Summer 1919 the army paid outstanding credits – mainly remaining wages – to soldiers or, in the case of those who had died, their family or nominated representatives. At the same time a War Gratuity was often paid. Having been discharged some time earlier, no outstanding wages had accrued but a War Gratuity of £4 15s. was paid Margaret, Harry's widow, in December 1920. This is equivalent to a *labour value* (wages) of around £510 in 2016. The fact that a War Gratuity was payable suggests that Harry saw active service. The record notes that Harry 'Died after Discharge'.

The War Gratuity was introduced in December 1918 as a payment to be made to those men who had served in WW1 for a period of 6 months or more home service or for any length of service if a man had served overseas. The rules governing the gratuity were implemented under Army Order 17 of 1919 but the amount paid was related to the length of war service.

No record has been found for either the subsequent marriage or death of Harry's widow, Margaret Edith Mellor.

Alphonso Mellor had died on 3 October 1916 in France and his account is given earlier in this work.

No certain record has been found of the death of Lucy Macgregor or of Harry's father, Richard, although it is possible that he died in West Derby, Liverpool, in late 1930 aged 85. Certainly, Richard lived in West Derby when he was first married in mid-1870.

No record of Harry's immediate family has been found in the 1939 Register. Fuller details of Harry's siblings, and their families, are given in the previous account [107: Alphonso Mellor].
