and the husband of Rose Baines, of "Beach Lea", Leighton Rd., Neston

Other than the note recorded by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission that Edward Baines was '...the husband of Rose Baines of "Beach Lea", Leighton Road, Neston', it is not known what connection, if any, Edward Baines had with the town. Neither Edward nor Rose seems to have any close family connection to Neston and it is possible that Rose moved to Neston, for reasons unknown, after Edward's death. Certainly, when Edward died, his stated address was Oxford Street, Liverpool.

Edward Birchall Baines was the fourth child of Liverpool publican William and Agnes Baines and he was born in the Toxteth area of the city on 8 September 1885 and baptised at Our Lady of Mount Carmel in Liverpool on 18 September. In 1891 the family was living at Pitt Street:


Pitt Street, now redeveloped, is in central Liverpool and not far from Liverpool Cathedral.

By the time of the 1901 census the family had moved some distance north in the city and were now in Walton:

William Baines, Edward's father, married Agnes Birchall at Lancaster Register Office in early 1879

Edward married Rose Ann Mitchell at Mount Pleasant Presbyterian Church, Liverpool, in late 1909 and in 1911, then aged 26, Edward and Rose were living in the large home of tailor Robert Skinner in Oxford Street, Liverpool (a continuation of Mount Pleasant, near Abercromby Square):



Edward Baines's Service Record has not been found and so it is not possible to give details of his time in the army or the circumstances of his death. However, it is known that Edward enlisted in Liverpool and he gave his place of residence as Edge Hill.

The 4<sup>th</sup> Battalion The King's (Liverpool Regiment) was an 'Extra Reserve' battalion which was formed on the outbreak of war, in August 1914, in Seaforth. Having moved to Edinburgh they mobilised on 6 March 1915 and the battalion landed at Le Havre and came under the orders of Sirhind Brigade, Lahore Division of the Indian Corps., based at

Robecq. On 10 November 1915 they transferred to the 137<sup>th</sup> Brigade, 46<sup>th</sup> (North Midland) Division and on 3 December 1915 were attached to the 56<sup>th</sup> and 58<sup>th</sup> Brigades, 19<sup>th</sup> (Western) Division. On 27 February 1916 they transferred to the 98<sup>th</sup> Brigade, 33<sup>rd</sup> Division.

Throughout the war the battalion was engaged in action on the Western Front, in 1916 being involved in The Battle of Albert, The Battle of Bazentin, The Attacks on High Wood and the capture of Boritska and Dewdrop Trenches. It is clear, from the War Diary, that the troops were in action in the front line near to Mametz Wood when Edward was killed on 29 April 1916:





Front line 30-8-16 Wet – enemy shelling heavily – relieved by 9<sup>th</sup> Royal Sussex Regt. – Guides at MAMETZ Village at 5 pm – 2 men wounded, 2 to hospital. 9 men returned from Field Ambulance.

Front line 31-8-16 Relief complete 4 am. Coys marched to BECORDEL Cross Roads independently. (?) were there – Battalion moved at 7 am to bivouac & huts nr. to DERNANCOURT arriving 10.30 am. Fine & warm day – rested – men bathed – one man to hospital & one from Field ambulance.






The inscription to Edward Baines on the Thiepval Memorial, Picardie, France.



The announcement of Edward's death notes that Edward and Rose had two children although only one possibility has been identified: a Norman E Baines (mother's maiden name: Mitchell) was born in Liverpool in the second quarter of 1912.

In Summer 1919 the army paid outstanding credits – mainly remaining wages – to soldiers or, in the case of those who had died, their family or nominated representatives. At the same time a War Gratuity was often paid. In June 1919 Edward's widow Rose, as sole legatee, received a payment of outstanding wages of £2 4s 9d from the army and, in October, a War Gratuity of £3. This, a total value of £5 4s 9d, is equivalent to a *labour value* (wages) of around £810 in 2016.

The War Gratuity was introduced in December 1918 as a payment to be made to those men who had served in WW1 for a period of 6 months or more home service or for any length of service if a man had served overseas. The rules governing the gratuity were implemented under Army Order 17 of 1919 but the amount paid was related to the length of war service.

In 1911 William Baines, Edward's father, was a 'commissioned agent', aged 59, boarding at 14 Westbourne Street, Liverpool - he was the only person entered on the census return for that residence. Agnes Baines (59) and her unmarried daughters Annie (31) and Juliana Victoria (23, domestic) were also boarding at 69 Cardwell Street, Edge Hill with seaman John Ernest Johnson and his family.

It is believed that William Baines died in mid-1912 in West Derby when his age was given as 58. Agnes Baines died in late 1921 in West Derby aged 69.

In the 1939 Register (29 September) Rose Baines (born 25 March 1888), Edward's widow, was living with three other persons, who do not seem to have been related to her, at 'Sunnymede', Liverpool Road, Neston. Rose was recorded as a midwife working for Cheshire City Council Municipal. Rose died, possibly in Neston, in early 1978.
