John Crossland Coyle was the eldest surviving child of bricklayer Thomas and Mary Jane Coyle. Although Thomas had been born in Liverpool, and Mary Jane Bradley in Chirk, they married St Mary's Church, Birkenhead, in late 1880 and in the 1881 census the couple, both 21, were recorded as living in Poplar Weint (off Park Street) in Neston.

Their first child, Margaret Ann, was baptised at Neston 13 February 1882 but died aged 6 weeks and was buried 20 March 1882. John Crossland Coyle, their second child, was baptised in the parish church on 22 June 1883 although his birth was not registered until the 3rd quarter of the year. Thomas and Mary went on to have a further nine children of whom only two survived beyond infancy:



John Crossland Coyle married Alice Taylor in Liverpool in early 1908 and in 1911 the family was living on Park Street, Neston:



No evidence has been found of the birth registration of Mary Coyle although a Mary Isobel Taylor was registered on Wirral in early 1907 and a Mary *Isabell* Coyle married Thomas Ernest Davies in Heswall in mid-1931. There is no other record for a Mary *Isabel* Taylor. Additionally, it does not seem that Alice Taylor had been married

previously so it would appear that Mary was illegitimate, born about a year before John and Alice married, and that her surname was then amended to *Coyle*.

- May registered as Dorothy May in late 1908 she married Harold Joseph Whittall at Neston Parish Church in mid-1935. Nothing further is known of her or their family although Harold may have died in Kingston-upon-Thames in early 1971.
- Ronald Crossland was registered in late 1910 on Wirral and he married Rachel Leighton in a Civil Marriage on Wirral in mid-1934. Nothing further is known of the family although it is believed that they had a number of children. They have not been found in the 1939 Register.
- Elizabeth J. Coyle born July / September 1912 and buried at Neston parish church aged 12 months, on 19 August 1913, when recorded as living on Leighton Road.
- Lille born late 1914, she married Robert Simister in July / September 1936 at Neston Parish Church. It is believed that they had two children, both registered on Wirral: Gillian M Simister (born mid-1938) and Michael R Simister (born mid-1945). The family has not been found in the 1939 Register.

It is believed that John Coyle enlisted in Birkenhead and it is surprising that there is no fuller report of John Coyle's death in local newspapers; it is also not known why the newspaper notification of his death requests 'Canadian Papers please copy'. John Coyle was serving with the 13th Battalion Cheshire Regiment when he died on 14 May 1916 aged 33.

The 13th (Service) Battalion, Cheshire Regiment (the 'Wirral Battalion') was raised in Port Sunlight on 1 September 1914 by Gershom Stewart, MP. Although a recruitment campaign in Port Sunlight, and Levers' soap Works, produced a large influx of new troops recruitment was Wirral-wide and local recruitment offices were established in many local towns. As John's name is not listed on the Port Sunlight War Memorial it is probable that he was not employed by Lever Brothers when he recruited.

The battalion moved to Chester and joined the 74th Brigade, 25th Division in Kitchener's Third New Army. The Division assembled in the area around Salisbury for training and the 13th Cheshires spent the winter in billets in Bournemouth.

The division moved to Aldershot in May 1915 for final training before proceeding to France on

The family gravestone at Neston parish church records that Mary Jane Coyle died, aged 63, on 5 March 1922 and that Thomas Coyle died 5 January 1941 aged 82.

Andrew Reginald Coyle [died 25 December 1963 aged 65], husband of Elizabeth, is also buried here and the gravestone also commemorates 'John Crossland....who was killed in France 13 May 1916 aged 33 years'. There is a one-day discrepancy between this date and the 'official' date of John's death, 14 May.

action around the time of John's death it is most probable that he had been wounded some time earlier, or he was injured as a consequence of a 'local' action. However, as his Service Record has not been found none of the details of John's army service or circumstances of his death are known.

Andrew Reginald Coyle, John's youngest brother, served as a driver with the Army Service Corps. in WW1; he survived and died in 1963. In the 1939 Register (29 September) he was recorded as having been born 13 February 1898 and was then a licensed victualler at the Greenland Fishery Hotel in Neston. In early 1923 Andrew had married Elizabeth M Parry (born 2 May 1903) in the Wrexham district and in 1939 Andrew's father, retired bricklayer Thomas, (born 1 October 1857) was with them. Thomas died, aged 82, in January 1941 and is buried in the family grave in Neston Cemetery.

Thomas William Coyle (born 11 September 1884), John's other brother, was recorded in the 1939 register as being a builder's labourer living at 6 Rushmere Road in the Norris Green district of Liverpool. With him was his wife, Laura (born 3 September 1878), although it is not known when they were married. It is also not known when Thomas died although Laura died in North Liverpool, aged 82, in mid-1960.

John's widow, Alice Coyle (born 5 May 1883), was living at 23 Chester Road, Neston, at the time of the 1939 Register and she died on Wirral in late 1967 aged 84. Lillian Simister, John and Alice's daughter, is believed to have died in Colwyn Bay in July / September 1982 aged 70 although it is not known when her husband, Robert, died.

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Army Registers of Soldiers' Effects, 1901-1929

In Summer 1919 the army paid outstanding credits – mainly remaining wages – to soldiers or, in the case of those who had died, their family or nominated representatives. At the same time a War Gratuity was often paid.

John Coyle had accrued a credit of £2 15s 6d and this was received by his widow Alice, as sole legatee. Alice received also the £5 10s War Gratuity.


The total payment, £8 5s 6d, is approximately equivalent to a labour value (ie wages) of about £1250 in 2016.

The War Gratuity was introduced in December 1918 as a payment to be made to those men who had served in WW1 for a period of 6 months or more home service or for any length of service if a man had served overseas. The rules governing the gratuity were implemented under Army Order 17 of 1919 but the amount paid was related to the length of war service.

John Crossland Coyle is buried at Aubigny Communal Cemetery Extension at Aubignyen-Artois, a village approximately 15 km north-west of Arras.

Before March, 1916, Aubigny was in the area of the French Tenth Army, and 327 French soldiers were buried in the Extension to the West of what is now Plot IV. From March 1916 to the Armistice, Aubigny was held by Commonwealth troops and burials were made in the Extension until September 1918. The 42nd Casualty Clearing Station buried in it during the whole period, the 30th in 1916 and 1917, the 24th and 1st Canadian in 1917 (during the capture of Vimy Ridge by the Canadian Corps) and the 57th in 1918. The Extension now contains 2,771 Commonwealth burials of the First World War....
