Alfred Smith was probably the ninth, and last, child of Daniel and Mary Smith of Ness. Daniel Smith, the son of agricultural worker Daniel and Hannah Smith of Little Neston, married Mary Miller at St John's Church in Liverpool in April/June 1859 and their first child, Joseph, was born the following year.

In the 1861 census Daniel was recorded as being a gardener, aged 27, living at Windle Hill. Mary was 22 and Joseph was aged 1. Windle Hill, originally a separate hamlet, is the area of Little Neston to the north of the Chester High Road in the vicinity of the present-day Weatherstones House Care Home on Hanns Hall Road.

Alfred was baptised at Neston 28 September 1882 when Daniel was a labourer living at New Houses. New Houses was a terrace on New Houses Lane, Ness, now the rough track leading westwards from Well Lane, Ness, to the Dee marshes. When the collieries were operating this was one of the main routes used by miners from Ness and the terraced houses, now demolished but situated close to the present-day railway bridge over New Houses Lane, were built to house colliery employees.

Daniel and Mary Smith were living at New Houses at the time of the 1871 census (although their ages were recorded incorrectly) and they seem to have moved there by late 1866 when their son Daniel was born. Daniel was baptised at Neston Parish Church on 7 February 1867 when Daniel snr was recorded as a labourer.

At the time of the 1891 census Daniel and Mary were still living at Ness Colliery - presumably still at New Houses - but none of their younger children (Lemuel, Frederick, Ernest and Alfred) was in the household and they have not been traced elsewhere in the census returns for England and Wales. However, Fanny Smith had married John Thomason at St Chrysostom's Church, Everton, in late 1888 and they, and their two young children, were living with them:

Daniel Smith, Alfred's father, died aged 61 and was buried in Neston on 28 November 1898.

At the time of the 1901 census Mary (62) was living on Victoria Road, Little Neston, together with her son William (36, stonecutter, a widower with three young children, all born in Bromborough) and unmarried son Ernest (20, a coalminer).

The three children of William recorded in 1901 were: Edward (8), Jane (6) and Joseph (4). Joseph served with the 13<sup>th</sup> (Service) Battalion Cheshire Regiment in WW1 although he was taken ill and, on 15 June 1916, he was formally discharged as being physically unfit. By that date (aged 19 years 8 months) he had served for 1 year 284 days although, even having been on the front line in France, it is quite possible that he was not involved in any significant action. Joseph died in June 1918, in Neston, from medical conditions exacerbated by his active service and, although not recognised by the CWGC as a war casualty, he is included in this work as 163: Joseph Smith.

In 1901 Alfred Smith, 17, was boarding with William and Mary Leech at 9 Cleveland Street, Birkenhead when he was recorded as being a general labourer on the railway.

In the 1911 census Alfred Smith is recorded as boarding at 177 Samuel Street, Crewe, with widow Mary Brooks. With Alfred was his 5-year old son, (William) Donald <sup>1</sup> but Alfred's wife was not present in the household and her name, her location, and their date of marriage are unknown.

As Alfred Smith's Service Record has not been found nothing is known of his service with the 4<sup>th</sup> Battalion King's (Liverpool Regiment) or the circumstances of his death on 25 September 1918 when he would have been 36. However, it is believed that he served initially with the Cheshire Regiment (Service Number 62242) and it is known that he had served previously with the 1/7<sup>th</sup> Battalion King's (Liverpool Regiment). At the time of his enlistment he was living in Birkenhead and he enlisted in Birkenhead.

The 4<sup>th</sup> Battalion The King's (Liverpool Regiment) was an 'Extra Reserve' battalion which was formed on the outbreak of war, in August 1914, in Seaforth. Moving to Edinburgh they mobilised on 6 March 1915 and landed at Le Havre, coming under the orders of Sirhind Brigade, Lahore Division of the Indian Corps., based at Robecq. On 10 November 1915 they transferred to the 137<sup>th</sup> Brigade, 46<sup>th</sup> (North Midland) Division and on 3 December 1915 were attached to the 56<sup>th</sup> and 58<sup>th</sup> Brigades, 19<sup>th</sup> (Western) Division. On 27 February 1916 they transferred to the 98<sup>th</sup> Brigade, 33<sup>rd</sup> Division.


Throughout the war the battalion was engaged in action on the Western Front, in 1916 being involved in The Battle of Albert, The Battle of Bazentin, the attacks on High Wood and the capture of Boritska and Dewdrop Trenches.

In 1917 they took part in The Arras Offensive, The Actions on the Hindenburg Line, The Operations on the Flanders coast and The Third Battles of Ypres. In 1918 they were in action in The Battles of the Lys, The Battles of the Hindenburg Line and The Final Advance in Picardy. Alfred Smith was killed during the final stages of the war, the period commonly known as The Hundred Days Offensive. At this time the Allied forces launched a series of effective offensives against the Central Powers on the Western Front from 8 August to 11 November 1918, beginning with The Battle of Amiens. The offensive essentially pushed the Germans out of France, forcing them to retreat beyond the Hindenburg Line and leading to their eventual capitulation.

In mid-September 1918 the 4<sup>th</sup> Battalion King's (Liverpool Regiment), located north of the Somme river, moved eastwards from Grouches by bus to Lesboeuf (near Longueval) and were then marched to Léchelle on 17 September. The following day, progressing eastwards, they moved to Fins Ridge near Equancourt before (19 September) moving to the trenches near Villers Guislain. The initial objective was to take the commune of Villers-Guislain (taken on 30 September) before continuing the eastwards push towards the St Quentin Canal and Cambrai.

The War Diary record for this period (see following page) notes a restricted number of daily casualties in the days leading up to the main attack on 29 September. On the day

that Alfred died (25 September) one other man was killed and four others were wounded:





The ruins of Villers Guislain in 1918 Despite fierce fighting, Villers-Guislain was in German hands until the end of the war.


Villers Guislain was situated in the Allied sector in front of the Hindenburg Line and during the preparations for the battle it was the hiding place for a tank battalion intended to cover the right flank of the British attack. However, after the 30th November counter-offensive, the village was captured by the Germans. The British, with support from Indian cavalry, attempted to retake it with desperate but unsuccessful attacks, and the village was not liberated until 1918.



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Army Registers of Soldiers' Effects, 1901-1929

In Summer 1919 the army paid outstanding credits – mainly remaining wages – to soldiers or, in the case of those who had died, their family or nominated representatives. At the same time a War Gratuity was often paid. In July 1919 Phyllis Pritchard, as sole legatee, received payments of outstanding wages of £14 17s 11d from the army and a War Gratuity of £6 10s. This, a total value of £21 7s 11d, is equivalent to a *labour value* (wages) of around £3320 in 2016. The identity of Phyllis Pritchard is unknown.

The War Gratuity was introduced in December 1918 as a payment to be made to those men who had served in WW1 for a period of 6 months or more home service or for any length of service if a man had served overseas. The rules governing the gratuity were implemented under Army Order 17 of 1919 but the amount paid was related to the length of war service.

Alfred Smith is buried at Villers Hill British Cemetery at Villers-Guislain, 16 km southsouth-west of Cambrai and 4 km east of Gouzeaucourt.

Villers-Guislain was occupied by Commonwealth forces from April 1917 until the German counter attacks (in the Battle of Cambrai) at the end of November 1917. It was lost on 30 November and retained by the Germans on 1 December in spite of the fierce attacks of the Guards Division and tanks. The village was finally abandoned by the Germans on 30 September 1918, after heavy fighting. Villers Hill British Cemetery was begun (as the Middlesex Cemetery, Gloucester Road) by the 33<sup>rd</sup> Division Burial Officer on 3 October 1918, and used until the middle of October. [CWGC]

Details, given in order of their birth, are known of some of Alfred Smith's siblings:

Joseph – is believed to have married widow Mary Ellen Alexander (née Thompson) at a Civil Marriage on Wirral in early 1882. Mary Thompson had married David Walker Alexander in Liverpool in early 1872 and he died, aged 44, and was buried at Neston 20 April 1877. From the two marriages Mary produced twelve children of whom, at the time of the 1911 census, seven were still alive.

In 1911 Joseph was a bricksetter's labourer, 49, living with Mary Ellen (49) and unmarried daughter Jane (15, born Neston) at the Golden Lion Yard in the centre of Neston. Joseph Smith *may* have died in mid-1934 aged 72.

Joseph Smith joined the 13<sup>th</sup> (Service) Battalion, Cheshire Regiment in September 1914 and moved to France with his regiment on 25 September 1915. However, Joseph was admitted to a Field Ambulance at Armentières, west of Lille and close to the Belgium border, on 10 October as he was suffering from influenza. Joseph's health continued to suffer and eventually, on 15 June 1916, he was formally discharged from the army as being physically unfit. By that date (he was aged 19 years 8 months) he had served for 1 year 284 days. Even

having been on the front line in France, it is quite possible that he was not involved in any significant action. Joseph died in Neston in June 1918 from medical conditions exacerbated by his active service and, although he is not commemorated by the CWGC as a war casualty he is recorded as a casualty in this work [see 163: Joseph Smith].

Elizabeth – nothing is known beyond the 1881 census when, aged 19, she was living at home.

William – may have married Jane Jones at Our Lady & St Nicholas & St Anne in Liverpool in late 1890 but this is not certain. In the 1891 census William (27, agricultural labourer) and Jane (27, born Wales) were living on Chester Road, Bromborough. However, Jane died in early 1899, aged 32, and in 1901 William (36, stonecutter) was living with his three children (Edward, 8; Jane, 6; Joseph; 4, all born Bromborough), his unmarried brother Ernest and his widowed mother on Victoria Road, Little Neston. In 1911 William (39, labourer, building trade) was living with his two sons (Edward William, 18, domestic gardener and Joseph, 14, agricultural labourer) at 6, New Houses, Ness.

The 1939 Register recorded William at 1 Sunset Cottages, Well Lane, Ness:

William Smith born 7 August 1864 widowed, builder's labourer Margaret Edwards born 29 May 1894 single, general cook, unemployed

Martha G Edwards born 5 September 1896 single

The relationship, if any, between William and Margaret and Martha Edwards is unknown. The date of William's death is uncertain.

Daniel – married Harriet Thomason at a Civil Marriage on Wirral in April / June 1889. In 1901 Daniel (34) was a telephone linesman living with Harriet (30, born Burton) and three children (Joseph Clarke, 11, born Burton; Frank, 8, born Burton; Doris Elizabeth, 6, born Wrexham) at 3 Adam Road, Lower Bebington. In 1911 Daniel (44) was a telephone instrument operator living at 3 Willow Bank Road, New Ferry. Harriet was 40 and in the household were: Joseph Clarke Smith, 21, insurance clerk with Standard Marine; Frank, 18, nurseryman's apprentice at Dell Nurseries (Smith & Sons); Doris Elizabeth, 16, born Denbigh.

Harriet was a daughter of Burton tailor William and Elizabeth Thomason and the younger sister of John who married Daniel's sister, Fanny.

It is believed that Daniel Smith died in Wirral in late 1944 aged 77. Harriet's date of death is uncertain. They have not been located in the 1939 Register.

Fanny - married John Thomason at St Chrysostom's Church, Everton, in late 1888. John was a son of Burton tailor William and Elizabeth Thomason and the older brother of Harriet who married John's brother, Daniel.

In 1901 Fanny (30) and John (37, navvy) were living at Windmill Terrace in the village of Royston near Barnsley. Seven children, ranging in age from 11 to 5 months, were in the household and their places of birth - Burton, Ellesmere Port, Whitby, Little Neston, Egremont, Liversedge (West Yorkshire) and Royston - indicate that they had travelled around in the twelve years of their marriage. Fanny Thomason died in Neston in late 1908 aged 39. In 1911 John Thomason (47, widower, labourer) was living at 23, New Street, Colliery, Little Neston, with seven of his children. The youngest child, Harriet Freda Thomason, was recorded as being aged 2 (her birth was registered in July / September 1908) and it appears that Fanny died not long after her birth.

On the census return John indicated that he had had 12 children of whom 9 had survived. The only adult son in the household, Job Thomason (19, born Whitby) was a coal hewer's loader at the colliery and the last three children (Abigail, 6; Annie, 4, Harriet Freda, 2) had all been born in Little Neston. John Thomson may have died in early 1865 aged 68; although, in census returns, he consistently gave his birthplace as Sutton/Guilden Sutton this was his mother's

place of birth and the early census returns, when he was a child, record that he was born in Burton.

Lemuel - in 1901 Lemuel (26, single) was recorded as a tramway driver lodging at 44 Selwyn Street, Kirkdale, Liverpool. In April / June 1901 he married Elizabeth Mealor, of Neston at Our Lady & St Nicholas & St Anne, the Liverpool Parish Church.

In 1911 Lemuel (38) was a 'domestic chauffeur for medical practitioner' living with Elizabeth (37) and their three young children on Raby Road, Neston.

The 1939 Register recorded the family on Blackey's Lane, Neston:

Lemuel Smith born 10 March 1873 motor mechanic

Elizabeth born 26 March 1874

William born 11 May 1906 joiner (journeyman)

Lemuel and Elizabeth are buried at Neston Cemetery where their gravestone records that Elizabeth died on 23 February 1945, shortly before her 71<sup>st</sup> birthday. Lemuel died 29 April 1948 aged 75.



Frederick – married Martha Alice Dilworth at St Helen's Church, Tarporley, in July / September 1899 and in 1901 Frederick (24, steel maker's labourer) and Martha (25, born Willington, Shropshire) were living with their son Frederick Charles (1 week, born Crewe) at 6 Underwood Lane, Monks Coppenhall, Crewe.

In 1911 the family had returned to Neston and were living at 8 New Houses, Ness; Frederick was 31 and an iron foundry labourer and Martha was 32. They now had a family of five children at home (in their 11 years of marriage three other children had died) ranging in age from 10 to 2, all born in Crewe.

Frederick and Martha Alice are buried at Neston cemetery; Frederick died on 1 October 1933 aged 54 and Martha died on 18 May 1949 aged 73. Buried with them is Frederick Charles, recorded as their eldest son, who died 22 January 1969 aged 67.

In the 1939 Register Martha was recorded as living at 'Melrose', Talbot Avenue, Little Neston, with her unmarried children:



The relationship, if any, between the Smith family and Beryl Foden is unknown. Gladys Smith married George Harry Bott at a Civil Marriage on Wirral in early 1942.



Ernest and Mary Jane (Molly) are buried at Neston Cemetery; Mary Jane died on 30 March 1954 aged 62 and Ernest died on 7

April 1970 aged 90.

In the 1939 Register the family is is recorded at 5 New Street, Neston:

Vera Smith married Harold Basford at a Civil Marriage on Wirral in early 1940.

As the name of Alfred Smith's widow is not known, the date of her death is also unknown but it is believed that Donald Smith, the only child of Alfred recorded in the 1911 census, died on Wirral in early 1941 aged 35.
